WINTER HOME MAINTENANCE CHECKLIST

Suppress storm damage

- Regularly inspect your roof for damaged or missing shingles, cracked flashing, or deteriorated seals around vents, chimneys, and skylights
- Verify that your attic insulation is in good condition and meets recommended R-values for your region
- Seal gaps around pipes and openings with weatherstripping and caulk

Clean gutters and downspouts

- Schedule regular gutter and downspout cleaning, especially in the fall when leaves are shedding
- If DIYing, remove all debris, leaves, and twigs to ensure proper water flow
- Consider installing gutter guards or screens to prevent debris from entering in the first place



Clear walkways

- Regularly shovel and de-ice walkways, driveways, and stairs
- Shovel snow in layers

Prune trees and bushes

- Inspect trees and bushes for branches that are weak, dead, or overhanging
- Trim branches close to your house, roof, and utility lines. For taller trees, pole pruners provide that extra reach and are most useful for trimming

Prevent frozen pipes

- Use foam pipe insulation or heating tape to insulate pipes in unheated areas, like crawl spaces, attics, and basements
- Seal any gaps or cracks in the walls, floors, windows, or foundation that allow cold air to infiltrate to reach pipes
- During very cold nights, leave a slow drip from indoor faucets that connect to pipes vulnerable to freezing



Check carbon monoxide detectors and fire extinguishers

Change detector batteries annually, ideally before winter
Check your detectors' expiration date or lifespan, replacing them as needed
Install detectors and fire extinguishers on every level of the home, including the basement

Winterize your sump pump

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Cover the sump pit with a lid or airtight cover to block cold air

Service heating systems and heat sources

If your heating system has an air filter
replace it around every 1-3 months

- Replace heat exchangers, compressors, fans, and ducts in your furnaces
- Install a fireplace spark guard to prevent fires

Protect plants and outdoor spaces from freezing

Apply a layer of mulch to garden beds to insulate plant roots and protect them from freezing temperatures
Cover delicate plants with frost cloth or burlap to shield them from cold winds and frost
If you have moveable potted plants, bring them indoors or place them in a sheltered area to prevent freezing
Store or cover outdoor furniture to protect them from winter weather and prolong its durability

Stock up on supplies for winter

Make sure your kit has warm clothing,
nonperishable food, water, flashlights,
batteries, first aid kits, snow removal
tools, and a backup power source

- If you have a vehicle, service it before winter to ensure it's in good working condition
- Compile a list of all your emergency contacts. Aside from local authorities, this should include your family, neighbors, and even your utility company
